Remember the movie from the '70's with the famous line, "Love means never having to say you're sorry"? I get what they were trying to say, but I adamantly disagree. I think love means rushing to say you're sorry when you realize you've done something that has hurt another. Then taking steps to correct whatever you can in regards to the situation is next. In June, the United Church of Christ met for our 34th General Synod. General Synod is the biannual gathering of our denomination. Delegates, honored guests, speakers, exhibitors, and visitors from all across the country gathered in Indianapolis for 5 days of worship, FROM OUR educational sessions, discussion on resolutions, business meetings, keynote speakers, **PASTOR** fellowship, and covenantal connection. The business of the church was handled – electing new members to the Board of Directors who are tasked with the administrative oversight of

the denomination between Synods, and we elected a new General Minister and President of our United Church of Christ. After 8 years of serving in that role, the Rev. John Dorhauer is returning to local church ministry, and the Rev. Dr. Karen Georgia Thompson was elected. But the heart of the time together was in learning about, discussing, and voting on the resolutions brought to Synod by individuals, churches, and conferences across the denomination. I'll be sharing more about the resolutions over the next several weeks.

One of the most powerful moments came when Rev. Dorhauer spoke about our history – what we've been claiming as our heritage and what we've been teaching in confirmation classes for all 66 years of our existence. We've claimed 4 traditions as our heritage: the Congregational church, the Christian church, the Evangelical church, and the Reformed church. But a group of dedicated historians have brought to awareness the existence of a 5th tradition: the Afro-Christian Convention.

The story of the Afro-Christian Convention is one of faith, survival, and empowerment in the hostile environment of racism. From 1892 to the 1960s, the Afro-Christian Convention was composed of 150 churches and 25,000 members, located primarily in North Carolina and Virginia. In June 1957, when the founding/merging leaders of the new United Church of Christ processed through Cleveland, representation of the Afro-Christian Convention churches was folded into the representation of the Convention of the South—a 1950s initiative of the Congregational Christian denomination to fold Black churches of the South into a single conference.

But the spirit, worldview, worship, and impact of Afro-Christian Convention churches are not appropriately represented under the banner of the Congregational stream of UCC history, a stream informed predominantly by white perspective. The Afro-Christian Convention, born from the wellspring of independent Black churches with deep African rootedness, is rightly understood—and at last shared as a unique stream.

Rev. Dorhauer stood on stage in front of the gathered body and did two things. First he said, "We are sorry." He acknowledged that the actions of our founders were wrong. Then he said, "From this point on, our history will reflect that the United Church of Christ was formed from and grounded in 5 threads of traditions." Our website will be updated, our curriculum will be rewritten, and our narrative will change.

We are part of a denomination that has the faith and the confidence to take a look at our past, admit our mistakes, and forge a new path. Thanks be to God for the model set by our General Synod, of which we are a part. Love does mean saying you're sorry. And love in action is what brings about change. May it be so.


Volunteers Needed




Summer Book Study

The Light of God's Face

Psalm 4:1-8

"There are many who say, "Who will show us some good? Lift up the light of your face upon us, O Lord!" (Ps. 4:6)

Poetry is generally full of metaphors and imaginative language, and this is no less true of the Psalms,



perhaps the most well-known collection of poetry ever written. In our study of how metaphors for God and His attributes are developed throughout the canon of Scripture this month, we return to the book of Psalms today to look at how light is often used to describe the Lord.

Specifically, today's passage refers to the light of God's face (Ps. 4:6). When used of the Creator, light can mean several things, but it is often a reference to His glory, His beneficence, and His love of righteousness. To have the light of God's face shine upon a person, then, is to have the glory of the Lord shine in a special way on the illuminated individual. It indicates His approval of the person on whom He shines as one who is righteous in His sight.

Scripture describes the experience of God's light as the greatest blessing that any human being can ever enjoy. This is certainly true of today's passage, which says that the light of the Almighty's face brings more joy than the harvest of grain and wine (Ps. 4:7). For an agrarian society like ancient Israel, whose livelihood was dependent on such harvests, this is a powerful statement of the glory of the blessings of the Lord. In keeping with Psalm 4:6, we also see in the Aaronic blessing the idea that life in the light of God is the highest honor for mankind (Num. 6:22–27; John 8:12).

Importantly, the Bible is also clear that those who experience God's light are not to keep it to themselves but to share it with a world that is trapped in darkness. This, in fact, was the original call for Israel — to be the light of the world and illumine the way toward Yahweh, the only true God and covenant Lord of Abraham and his seed (Isa. 42:6). It is the call that our Savior gave to His church in the Sermon on the Mount (Matt. 5:14–16). As those who have been rescued from the darkness of sin, we have the responsibility to shine forth the truth of Christ in our words and our deeds, that people would see the true gravity of their sin and turn from it to the light of grace and holiness revealed in Jesus. This is a high calling indeed, and it is one that we could never fulfill if left to ourselves. Thankfully, we have not been left to ourselves but have been given the Spirit to shine through us as we follow the Lord.

Communications: Ken Kroah addressed council about needs in our community under the category of Home Ministry. First, the in-home needs of an elderly lady. She has need of a new oven and central air. Central air has been repaired for now. Estimates indicate a price range of approx. \$4000.00 The Mary Martin Estate Fund is available to cover a portion of the costs. Suggestions were given by council members to contact others such as the Licking County Aging Partners. A motion was made by Francis Hill to approve up to \$1000.00 for stove and labor with a second by Frank Davis. Motion approved.

A second project that Ken shared with council is taking place at Licking Valley Middle School. The Food Pantry at the school is in need of a new coat of paint and some organization. An Eagle Scout candidate has taken on this project, but as with any project such as this, there will be expenses. Donations are encouraged and will be evaluated in the future.

Treasurer's Report: Giving as of June 30th was (\$7965.45) less than budgeted and expenses were (\$4416.54). That leaves us with a budget deficit of \$3548.91. Finance and Stewardship Committee did not meet in July. A motion to approve the report was given by Francis Hill, with a second from Julie Davis. Motion approved.

Pastor's Report: Joyce Wealand: Lots of summer activities for the pastor with VBS, camp and a conference. The book study held at a coffee shop in downtown Newark is generating good conversation and attendance and is receiving positive feedback. A Bible study will begin in September. Communications: Two requests for use of facility have been received and are as follows: September 23, 2023, Women's Retreat and October 22, 2023, Trunk or Treat. Motion to approve the use of the facility for both events received by Kirk Homrighouse with a second by Tim Powers. Motion approved.

Old Business: A 50% down payment has been made on the boilers for St. John's U.C.C.

New Business: Julie Davis addressed council with news from the Coalition of Care. A campaign known as the 20 for 20 campaign is being promoted. To assist with this fundraiser Julie will address the St. John's U.C.C. congregation, at both services in August. A motion to participate in the COC fundraiser was made by Frank Davis with a second from Kirk Homrighouse. Motion approved.

Foundation Fund Meeting: A motion to create a foundation fund in the name of Thomas Waters was made by, Kirk Homrighouse with a second by Owen Lee. Motion carried.

Adjourn: A motion was made by Jeff Conner with a second by, Kirk Homrighouse that this meeting of the Church Council be adjourned. Motion carried. The meeting was adjourned at 7:43 p.m.
